Stop the Press... DEXX is here

There's been great excitement throughout The Vet Centre clinics as we have invested in an innovative upgrade on our in-house laboratory testing. Our new IDEXX machines allow us to provide you, our customers with far more comprehensive and accurate in-house blood and urine results ... within minutes. We are also able to access IDEXX's expert clinical support team to assist us in diagnosing complex cases.

SDMA is one of the tests we now have on hand which allows us to identify kidney disease (commonly seen in our older cats, but also in dogs) at earlier stages than previously. Early diagnosis helps us determine how advanced the disease is, enabling your pet to get the best treatment plan while there is still time to make a difference in their quality and longevity of life.



Aside from SDMA testing, we can also test optimum time for mating in dogs, dynamic liver function testing, inflammatory marker measurement, urine analysis and detailed blood cell analysis. Previously a lot of these tests were outsourced which meant delays in reporting to you. Your peace of mind is important to us – immediate answers allow us to formulate a treatment plan faster when it matters.

It's a cruel cruel summer ...

Summer can be really hard on our pets – they are covered in fur; and they don't sweat as we do. Panting is how they regulate their body temperature. With hotter temperatures heat stroke becomes is a very real threat to them. It can cause seizures, blood clotting disorders, damage to internal organs – all of which can lead to tragic death.

Our short-muzzled buddies; Persians, Bulldogs, Frenchies, Pugs and the like... these guys have a tighter facial bone structure which makes it much harder for them to breathe in sufficient oxygen to cool them down Please be mindful they will suffer more than most from the excesses of sun and heat.

Heat stroke is an EMERGENCY and if untreated, is life threatening.



The do's and don't's over summer

- Longer haired pets should be clipped to remove thick coats allowing them to cool more effectively; dry quicker and prevent hot spots
- Ensure your pet has easy access to cool shady areas with plenty of water and airflow.
- Provide cold water baths or hose down your pet to keep them cool
- Don't leave your pet unattended in cars during summer. Temperatures in cars can reach extreme levels within a few minutes – even with the windows open.
 - Don't walk your pet in the middle of the day. Exercise in the morning or evening when it's cooler.
- Don't underestimate how hot it is walk on concrete, sand or asphalt during summer – it can cause serious damage and burns to your pet's paws.
